Population Density, 1860

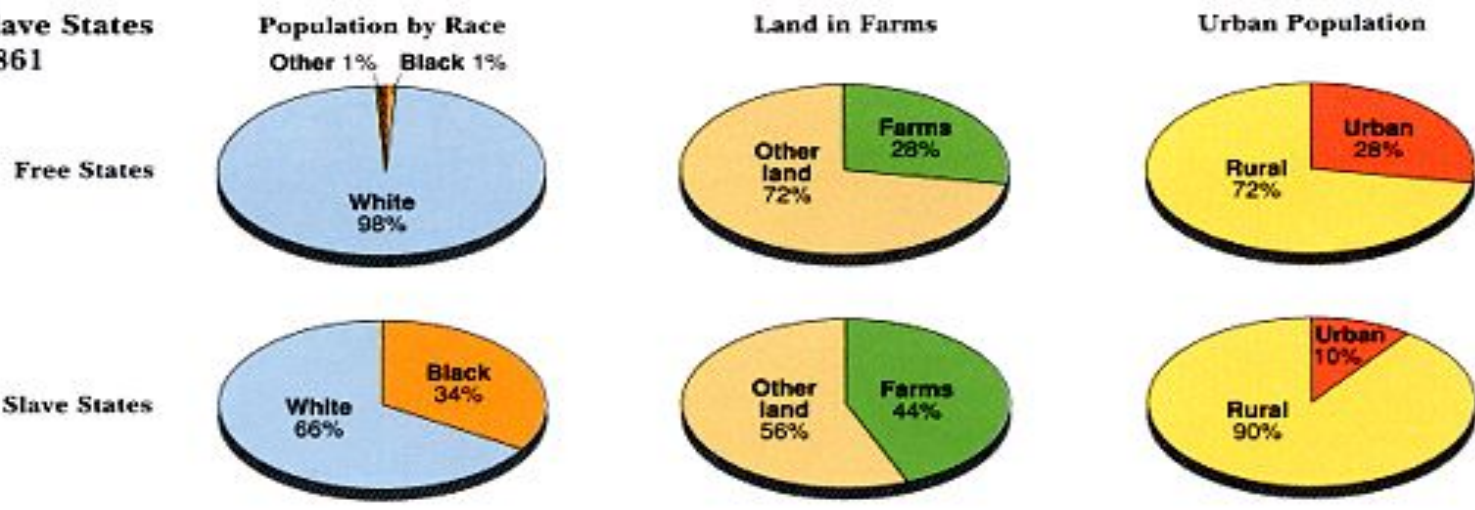

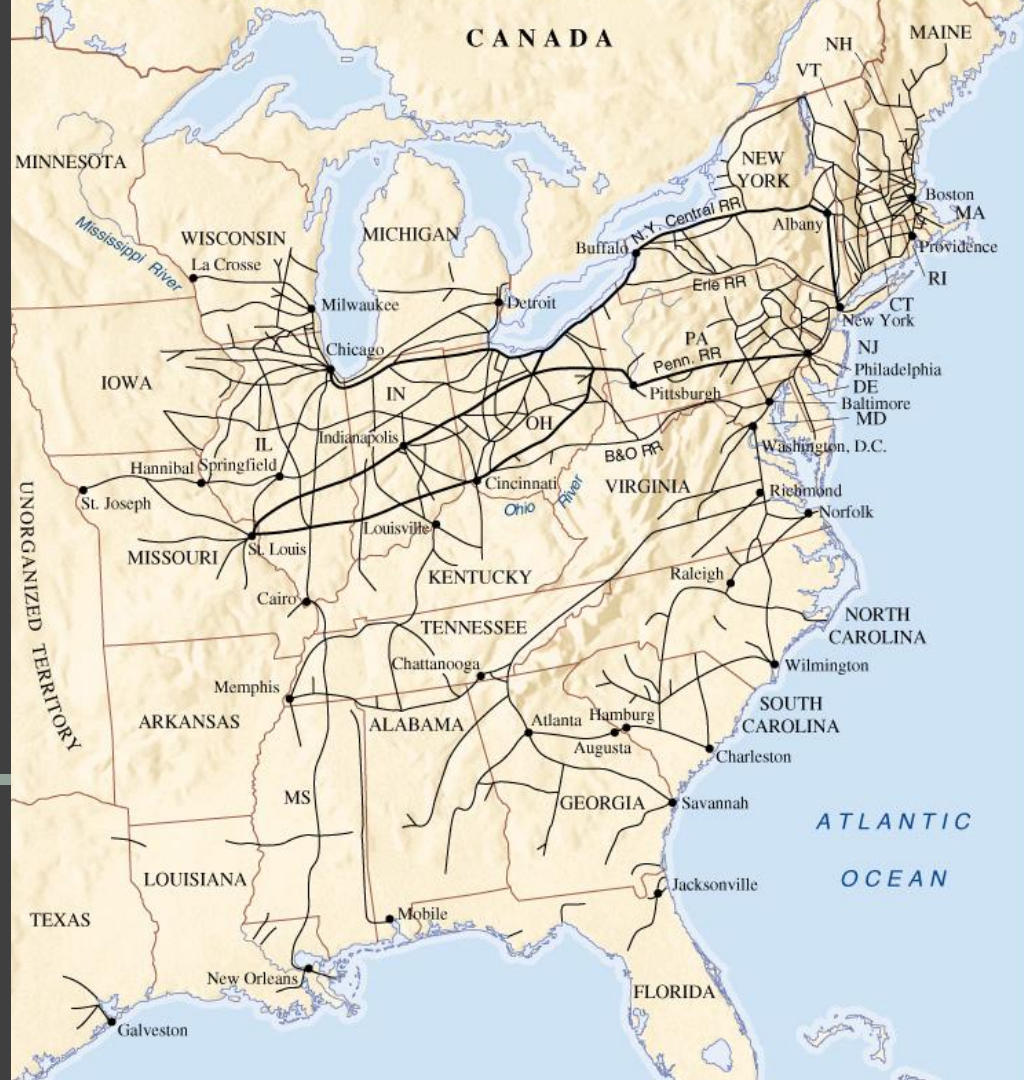
Slave/Free States Population, 1861

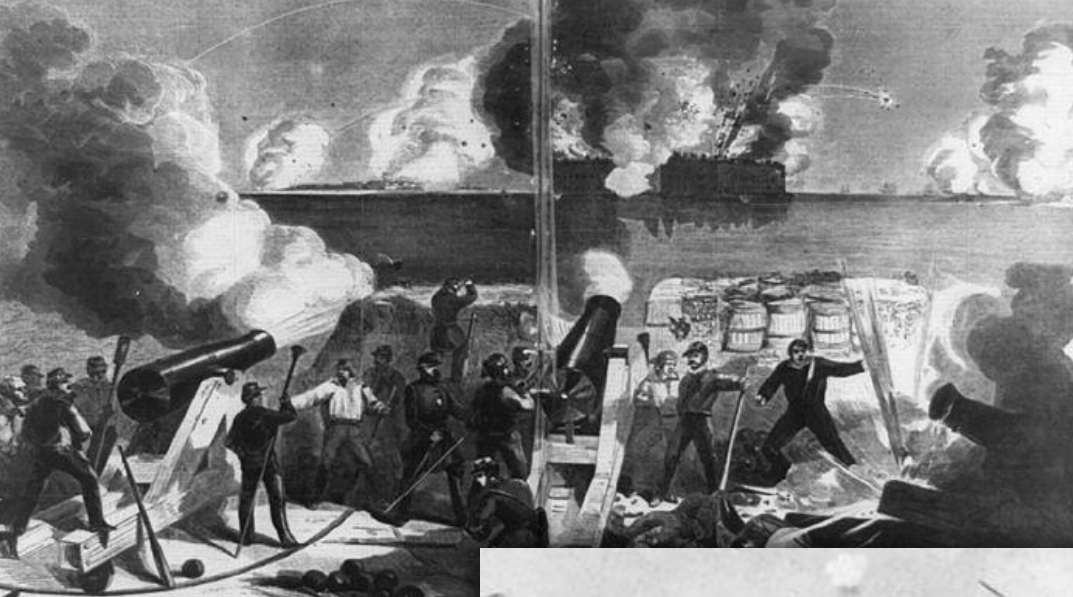

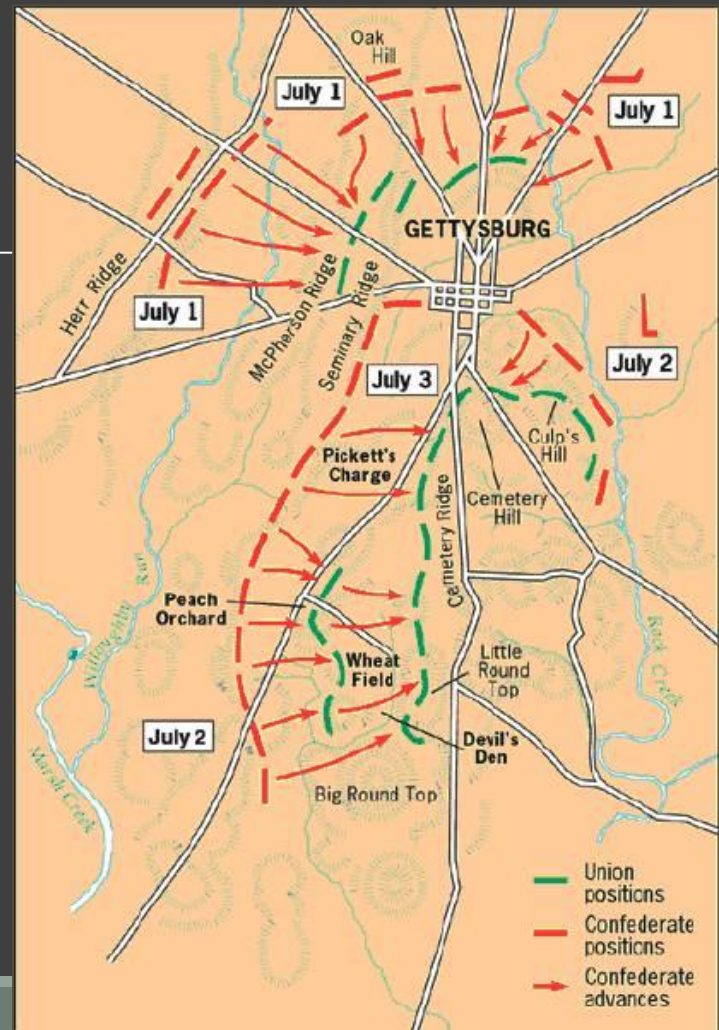
