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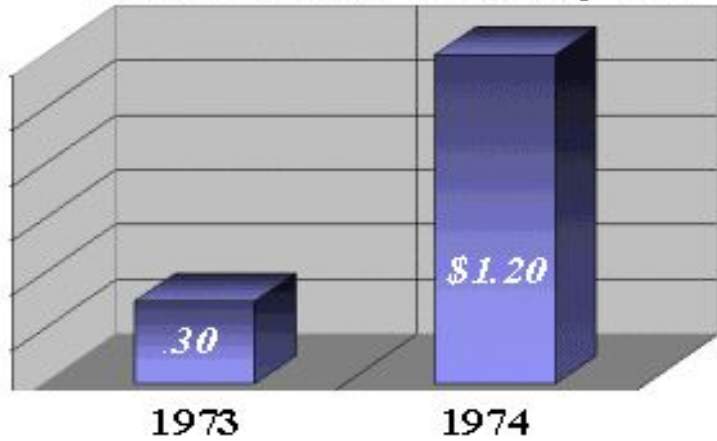

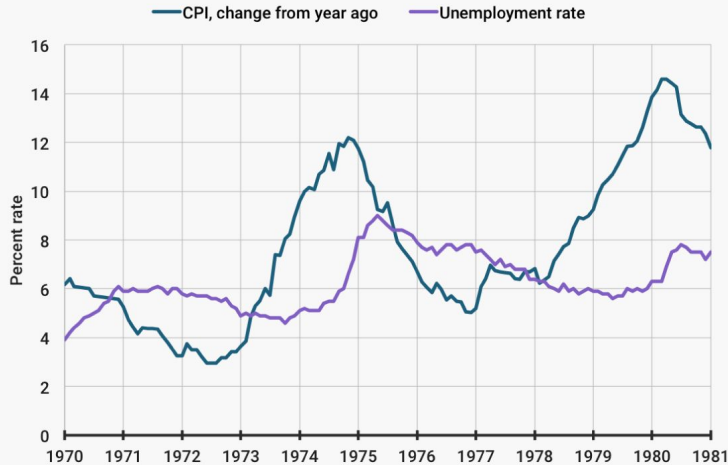

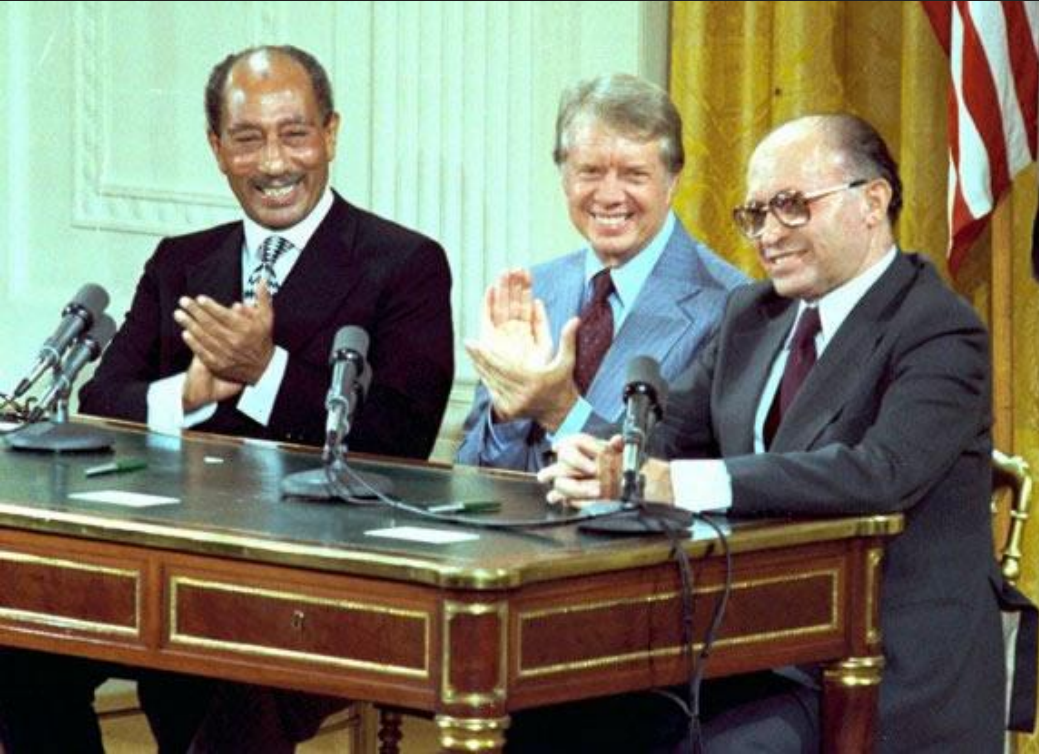

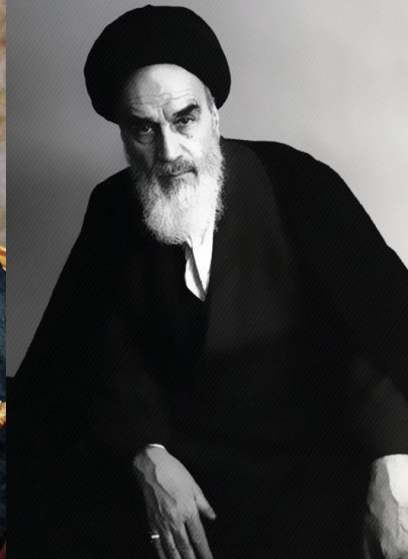

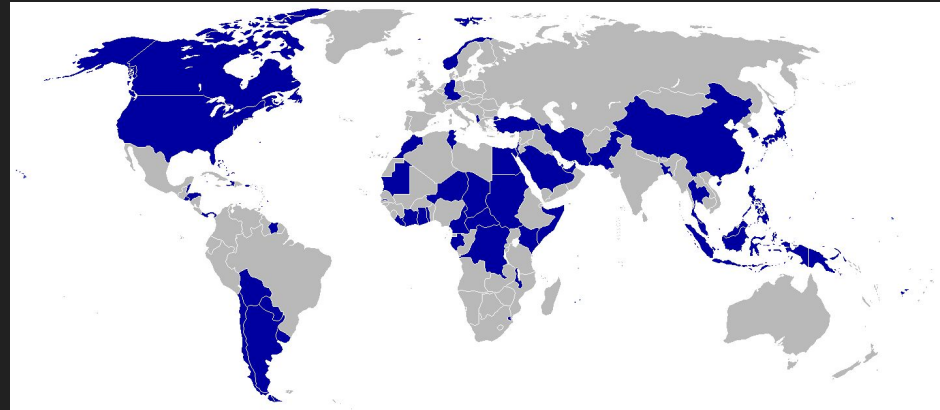

Carter Fights 'Killer Rabbit' With Paddle On Fishing Trip

WASHINGTON (AP) — A "killer rabbit" attacked President Carter as a recent trip to Palm Beach, Fla., penetrating secret Service security and forcing the vessel's occupants to beat back the beast with a canoe paddle.

The rabbit, which the president later learned was fleeing to public from some predator, actually went toward a house near which Carter was fishing in a pond. It was bleeding profusely. Its teeth flashed and scuttled forward, and making straight for the president.
