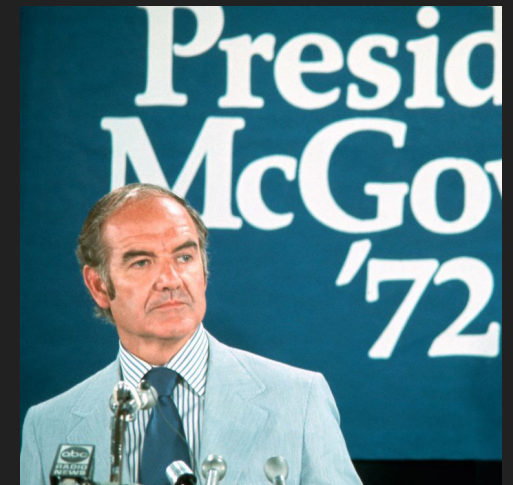

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### TURKS' PROPOSAL RESTORES HOPES AT CYPRUS TALKS

Athens Gets U.S. Assurance  
of Support for All Efforts  
for Peaceful Solution

GENEVA, July 27—American  
assurance to Athens and  
Turkish cooperation proposals  
revived hope today that the  
three-nation conference here  
could reach an agreement on  
enforcing the cease-fire in  
Cyprus and open the way for  
further negotiations.

session yesterday, when the  
Greek Foreign Minister, George  
Mavros, said that he could see  
negotiate while Turkish forces  
continued advancing in Cyprus.

### Reinecke Convicted of Lie On I.T.T. Offer to G.O.P.

California Lieutenant Governor Found  
Guilty Over His Testimony at Hearing  
on Pledge to Convention in 1972

WASHINGTON, July 27—The  
indictment and also for a  
Lieut. Gov. Ed Reinecke of  
California was found guilty by  
a Federal jury today of lying  
in a hearing in which the Senate  
Judiciary Committee delved into  
a corporation's pledge to help fi-  
nance the Republican National  
Convention of 1972.

As Clayton D. Roth, foreman  
of the jury, said, "We find the  
defendant guilty," Jean Reinecke,  
wife of the 50-year-old Lieu-  
tenant Governor, gasped and  
said: "My God, no! No, he  
didn't!"

Later, Mr. Reinecke, a Republi-  
can, called the verdict "a gross  
miscarriage of justice."

James E. Cox, his attorney,  
said that he would file peti-  
tional motions for dismissal of  
charges.

Sentencing is expected in  
about six weeks. Meanwhile,  
Mr. Reinecke will be free on  
his own recognizance. Convic-  
tion for perjury carries a maxi-  
mum penalty of five years im-  
prisonment or a fine of \$2,000,  
or both, on each count. There  
was only one count before the  
jury.

Mr. Reinecke was indicted  
last April 3 on three counts of  
having lied to the Senate Judi-  
ciary Committee.

### NIXON 'CONFIDENT'

Ziegler Sees a Lack of
